New sport honours for Newcastle

## HANDBALL CHAMPIONS AT FIRST GO!

NEWCASTLE University are the Handball Champions of British Universities. They won the Championship last term, and last week-end successfully defended their trophy in Edinburgh.

The game, introduced to the University last year, is very popular in Scandinavia, and seven large Norwegians squeezed into an 1100 and set off to do battle for the Heriot-Watt Trophy.

The tournament was arranged at Strathclyde University and 5 teams took part. This was Newcastle's first match, and first victory, and seven substitute players returned with a large silver cup.

### FRACTURED

Whereas all the other teams had substitutes, Newcastle had only their full team and so sometimes had to play for twenty-minute halves non-stop.

Last week-end, ten players went to Edinburgh to defend the trophy.

Seven teams were playing outdoors on two tennis courts, and as they were playing on fairways, the players had rather a rough time. In fact one of the Newcastle team, Ebbin Poulsen, fractured his right foot in the game against Strathclyde.

Handball is played on a pitch the size of a large tennis court. At each end there is a goal, about half the size of a soccer goal, or perhaps smaller. In front of this there is a semi-circle, from within which goals cannot be scored. There are seven players, including the goalkeeper, on

the field at any time, but a team consists of ten players, who interchange every five minutes or so. A game usually lasts for two thirty-minute halves.

The ball, which is smaller than a football, and can be held in the hand, cannot be

held for more than three

seconds, nor run with for more than three steps. It is, therefore, a very fast game. Newcastle's team, however, is composed entirely of Norwegians. They feel that this makes handball in this University somewhat a minority sport.

WHEN asking an Englishman what handball is, one is liable to get three or four suggestions, of which none is correct. It is to be concluded with great sadness that most Englishmen haven't the vaguest idea about the game. It is to be hoped that they all feel so offended by this insult that they will now read on with keen interest.

Handball is a game which has great popularity throughout the world, and it is gaining still more. The bulk of its support however comes from Europe. It is also played in Russia, Turkey, Iceland and even North-America. But in the very middle of this lies England, almost untouched by the charm of this fast game. This is a situation which handball enthusiasts aim to change, and it should be possible. The fact that the English are world-champions in football shows that England is full of ball-talent. A good footballer or basketballer will almost certainly be a good handballer.

Handball is a game which may be played indoors as well as outside, and by both sexes - give it a try, it might well be a game suiting your temperament and abilities.

### TRAINING

Last year, Newcastle University Handball Club was started, and it is already recognised as a member of Athletics Union, which means a grant to cover expenses for gear and fixtures. The club is also a member of the British and English Amateur Handball Association. Two tournaments were arranged last year, in which six different teams took part. The University Club won them both.

Today the club has around 40 members, from which are selected the 1st, 2nd and, if enough interest is shown, 3rd teams. Hence there is always a chance for you. Everyone is invited along to the training sessions, and will be given instruction if they go. You don't know the game? - so no skill is expected of you. Training sessions are arranged weekly, starting October 23, 8.30 p.m. to 10 p.m. at Lightfoot Sports Centre, Wharrier Street, Walker (Bus No. 19 and 12). For further information, have a look at the notice-board in the Physical Education Department (later to be moved to the Union Foyer), or contact any of the Norwegian students. # TROPHY RETAINED

13 March 1968

THE University Handball Club retained its British Universities Championship title in a tournament held in Newcastle on 2nd-3rd March. The tournament, which went down well, was held at the Lightfoot Sports Centre between six teams. Newcastle were joint favourites with Sunderland Technical College. Herriot Watt University, Edinburgh, had a rather poor start in its first match on Saturday afternoon. Hopes for repeated success in the Cup were rapidly fading as the University, facing Glasgow, only managed to escape with a close 9-7 victory after a match marked by lack of self-confidence and precision in the team.

### BRILLIANT

However, as the afternoon went by, Newcastle seemed to improve in every match, growing with the standard of their opponents. In the team's second match versus Herriot Watt, Newcastle lead all the way although winning only 9-7. Also Queens University, Belfast was later on held to a 9-7 victory, the match being clearer than the actual result suggests.

The last round on the Saturday included Sunderland against Newcastle. So far both teams had a clear three victory record. But Sunderland, having the better goal average, started favourites in this match so vital to the final outcome of the tournament. Newcastle, however, after getting a good start, seemed to settle down very easily, putting on by far the best performance of the tournament.

With this the cup was already more or less won and the next day Newcastle confirmed its strong position thrashing Strathclyde University, Glasgow, by 16-1. Sunderland came through to beat Queen's University by 7-5 to gain second place in tournament.

# SECOND VICTORY

# Good start

# Thumbs down for Uni. Handball team

NEWCASTLE University Handball Club had invited seven teams to Lightfoot Sports Centre for last weekend to play for the Geordie Cup. For reasons not under Newcastle's control only four teams showed up on Saturday morning, the teams being Sunderland, Heriot Watt (Edinburgh), Teesside Flyers and Brentwood, and, of course, Newcastle the Cup-holders.

It was decided to let all the teams play League in one group at first. Then the fifth would have to play against the fourth, and the winner of that match would have to face the first as one semi-final, the other one being played between the second and third so that the tournament

would have a final, a solution that may not have been the best one after all.

The tournament was started by Newcastle v. Sunderland. The two teams know each other well from various test matches and a tournament in Edinburgh last December and Newcastle wanted to make up for what they thought had then been a very unlucky 5:6 defeat. The final score was 6:4 to Newcastle who did some splendid performances on Saturday and ended up first.

## MUCH EFFORT

On Sunday morning Teesside Flyers, one player short the day before, gained a 9:7 win over Brentwood and had to play Newcastle again. The first semi-final Sunderland v. Heriot Watt ended 4:6 and was almost the exact reverse of Saturday's match when Sunderland had won by 7:4. Newcastle had to work hard to secure their 11:5 win against Teesside.

After a 6:0 lead Newcastle knew the match was theirs, yet much effort had to be put into the second half (2 x 15 min.) and they were rather exhausted when the final whistle blew.

In the match for the third position, Sunderland beat Teesside 12:9.

## UNLUCKY

The final between Newcastle and Heriot Watt saw a rather tired and somewhat unlucky Newcastle team unable to play their game like they had done the day before when, after a 4:0 lead by Heriot Watt, they had fought back and won 5:4. Heriot Watt at once took the lead, led 7:2 at half-time (2 x 20 min) and won by 15:5. There is no doubt that the better team won, though Newcastle weren't as bad as a 10-goal difference might indicate.

The atmosphere of the tournament was friendly though some players obviously mixed up rugby or something else and Handball and committed some rather ugly fouls for which they were duly sent off. The tournament did, however, lack spectators or supporters, whose cheering might have livened things up and would certainly have created some of the flair which at least those players from the continent (Norway, France, Germany) are accustomed to.

# Handball display promise in debut

Last weekend the Newcastle University handball had a promising showing at the University Handball Championships in Manchester, organised by the ABUHC. Overall the team had 3 wins and 2 losses.

Getting off to a good start with a 6-3 win over Bangor they then fell to a 5-13 defeat to group-winners Oxford. A rather unjust score line of 4-9 against Lincoln A followed, in what was a closely contested game for the most part. Both sides had drawn a fixture only two weeks earlier.

Despite this sore defeat, Newcastle picked themselves back up to seal a narrow 4-3 win over Lincoln B to ensure third place in their group. However, the loss to Lincoln A meant qualification to the quarter-finals was not possible, but third entailed a play-off against Brighton.

In what was probably one of the games of the tournament, Newcastle prevailed 7-6 victors. In engaging a new set of tactics, Brighton were caught off guard, conceding two suspensions and two penalties. After some spectacular goals from Juan Carlos Sanchez "Kacho", a frantic finish ensued with Brighton looking for an equalizer. Despite top-scorer Geofrey Laborde coming off injured and receiving a suspension themselves, Newcastle stayed strong defensively to pull off a fantastic victory.

The University of Essex won the competition after beating the Uni-

versity of Manchester in the final. Newcastle's final win meant an overall joint 9th place position out of over 20 teams, in what is the Handball Club's first competitive showing.

The Club was established following on from a popular series of GoPlay sessions ran by NUSU. The team is multicultural with Spanish, French, German and Mexican students among an encouraging number of British players. Several of the British contingent have been asked to attend trials for the Great Britain Students' squad, with a forthcoming update should any make the cut.

Mark Harrison, who has been coaching the team and leading from the sidelines for the Championships said, "to finish in the top half of the tournament amongst some highly experienced teams, in what is our first year in existence, is phenomenal. It was necessary for the players to give 100%, and not one of them disappointed."

The Newcastle University Handball Club is under the Presidency of Jack McKay and after such a successful first season with a largely beginner squad, plans are already underway for a larger recruitment programme in September and entry into a national England Handball league.

Sports Editor **Calum Wilson** visited the Newcastle Vikings Handball Club to discuss the rise of Handball in the North East.

Founded in 2012, amidst the aftermath of Olympic fever, the Newcastle Vikings became the first developmental Handball club to hail from the city. Despite their humble beginnings, the club set out on a mission to grow Handball in the North East. Four years on, the club and the sport is showing great promise.

The Newcastle Vikings currently boast a Men's, Women's and Junior team. The Men's and Women's teams both compete in the England Handball North Regional Development League. The Vikings made their debut in the league last season, with both sides finishing in an impressive 4<sup>th</sup> position.

As the Vikings enter the latter half of only their second year in the Development League, both teams look set for top four finishes once more. Last Saturday, the Men's team beat the combined outfit Leeds Hornets/University of Huddersfield, at their home venue at South Shields' Temple Park Leisure Centre.

Despite starting the match as underdogs, with the visitors 2<sup>nd</sup> in the table, the Vikings sailed into a 3-1 lead thanks to an early hat-trick from left-winger Gracjan Joppek. Joppek, who is Polish, was one of 5 non-British members of the diverse 10-man Vikings squad, epitomising the international appeal of Handball.

Left-half Athbi Almarzouq, a Kuwaiti student studying at Northumbria University, extended the Vikings' lead to 6-2 later in the half. A two-minute sin-bin for the opposition number 4 allowed the hosts to stretch their advantage to 10-3 before the first time-out. The two teams then traded blows, before going into half time at 13-6.

The start of the second period was a much more even encounter. Daniel Walsh in the Vikings' goal was called into action on a couple of occasions as the visitors tried to mount a comeback. Leeds/Huddersfield added to their tally, but a breakaway goal from Matthew Lamb soon restored the 7-goal difference.

Almarzouq and Joppek were amongst the scorers as both sides shared a flurry of late goals. The Vikings held on, with the match finishing 22-15. However, the day's entertainment was far from over as the Vikings played host to the second round of the North East Handball Tournament, against teams from Durham and York.

Organised by Vikings' Head Coach Marlen Slinning, the friendly tournament is designed to help develop Handball across the North East of England. "The plan for us is to get more clubs in the North East", Slinning explained. "In the UK, I think Handball is actually growing, but here in the North East we are a step behind most places."

Neither Newcastle University or Northumbria University currently field an official Handball team, but Slinning is hopeful that the Vikings can work closely with the Universities in the future. "We want Handball to be active within the Universities. We would want to work together with any University clubs to develop Handball in the North East."

Slinning, who comes from Norway and has years of Handball experience, also wants to develop the sport amongst younger children. "We have sessions for children down to the age of 8, we are trying to get kids involved at a younger age. So we have improved, in that we started with just Women and Men and now we offer Handball for kids, but it is a slow process to develop Handball in the North East."

## Vikings propelling invasion of Handball

For a sport that's so popular in the rest of Europe, handball has a surprisingly low profile in the UK. But just six years after its foundation the Newcastle Vikings Handball Club boasts a men's and a women's team, alongside junior teams, and counts several Newcastle students among its members.

Handball's popularity elsewhere in Europe and further afield explains the club's high number of international members, and Newcastle University students such as Maren Liane and Emily Bjerk joined the club after growing up playing the sport in Norway. Fellow Norwegian Pål Jakobsen had limited experience before arriving in the UK, but was a keen follower of the sport and now enjoys playing for the Vikings.

Liane explains the sport as "a mix between football, basketball and rugby," with the simplicity of football combined with the pace and high scores of basketball.

"Everyone plays defence, and everyone plays attack, so everyone runs the whole court," she continued. "You also have tackles as well, so it's a bit more physical than basketball in that sense." Indeed, the lack of protective clothing is deceptive; handball can be a brutal sport.

The Vikings, however, tend to play in a more friendly manner, making the club a good starting place for beginners. The unlimited subs in handball makes it relatively easy for beginners to gain match experience, and Vikings members are more than welcome to just attend training sessions.

These sessions are held twice a week: Monday evenings in South Shields and Wednesday evenings in Benfield, just next to Walkergate Metro.

For those looking to get a bit more competitive, the club holds training matches and competes in handball leagues. "There's a few people who started off with just doing training," Liane explained, "and then they joined the training matches and now they're playing the league."

The men's team currently sits at the bottom of the National North division, but is more concerned with gaining experience and having fun than racking up a string of victories.

"We're quite new; we have a mix of abilities," Jakobsen explained. "We know we're not going to be the best in this league, and therefore there's not much complaining either. We're there to develop and have fun, basically."

The women's team is currently a division lower, in the Regional North league. Like the men, they want to win but their main motivation is the fun of playing matches.

The club was set up in the aftermath of the London 2012 Olympics, where the appearance of a British handball team sparked a wave of interest in the sport across the country. Team GB crashed out of the Games after losing every single one of their matches, but their presence helped to introduce handball to a British audience.

The Vikings' membership consists of a mix of students – particularly those such as Liane and Bjerk who played the sport before coming to the UK – and locals. While setting up a handball club in Newcastle University's Athletic Union could help to attract more student members this would also require a lot of work and dedication from its founders, so for the time being the Vikings are the main source of Tyneside handball action.

"I think quite a few people are keen when they come to university to try something new, to do something they've never done before," Liane explained. But unlike the AU clubs' ability to advertise their sports at freshers' fair, the Vikings are not part of the University and so can't benefit from this kind of publicity.

"It's a challenge with us being an outside club," she continued. "Because it's hard to get in contact with students unless they know about handball beforehand."

One of the club's main aims going forward is to reach out to junior players. By building connections with local schools the Vikings can introduce handball to a new generation of players, and ultimately encourage more British kids to take up the sport. The junior teams have their own training sessions and can take part in under-16 competitions if they want to.

The three students are keen to spread the word about their beloved sport. Liane summarised a typical encounter with English students: "everyone that I've explained it to is like, 'Oh that sounds really cool. Why do we not have it?' and I think with it being an indoor sport as well, it's quite nice for England!"

"The basic rules are quite easy to get into, it's a bit like football in the sense that as long as you have a ball you can start to play, which is good for beginners."

Anyone is welcome to join the Vikings and try out handball. The club offers three free taster sessions for newbies, and Bjerk points out that a great way to find out more about the sport is to tag along to a training session. "If there are people who don't know what it is they can also come by and just watch and see what we're doing, she explained. "They don't have to train, they can just sit and watch how it works."

If handball's moment has finally come in the UK, the Vikings are at the forefront of this expansion. Their mix of competition and fun and welcoming attitudes towards beginners makes the club an important part of the development of handball in the UK, and the Norwegian students hope that their enthusiasm for the sport will be shared by more of their fellow students in Newcastle.

## Handball marks return to BUCS action

Newcastle Vikings track the history of handball in the North East and how its making its big return to BUCS

Handball, often referred to as a mix of basketball, football and volleyball, is the fastest team ball sport in the world, and has rapidly grown in popularity in the UK, since capturing the British public's attention at the London 2012 Olympic Games.

Earlier this year, BUCS Innovative Sport Review saw handball asked to deliver a successful pilot of its proposal over the coming season, with a view to initiating formal BUCS implementation for the 2020-21 season.

This recognition goes added impetus to the annual British University Handball Championships, which this season is set to take place over the weekend of 6-8 March 2020 down at the Medbury Sports Park in Kent. Newcastle University doesn't cur-

rently have a men's or women's handball team, but it does have a rich handball heritage. In fact, Newcastle University was one of the top handball clubs in the country back in the late 1960s and early 1970s when handball was first introduced to the UK. Initiated by a group of mainly Norwegian students, they were dominant five-time winners of the men's British University Handball Championships and also defeated Great Britain's fledgling handball teams in the 1972 Goonle Cup tournament a few weeks before the British team's debut in Olympic qualification competition!

After a 20-year hiatus, a mid-1990s revival of the university championships once again saw Newcastle's mostly Scandinavian men's and women's teams do really well, including becoming the first women's university handball champions in 1995.

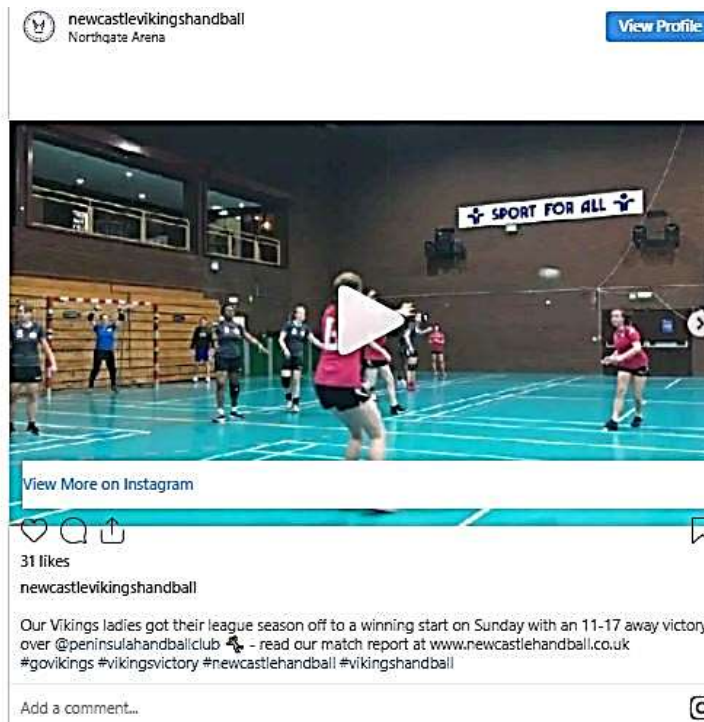

One thing for sure - the Vikings are the first and only handball club in the North East to play competitively, the new squad taking on 14 other teams from across Britain in the Association.

Slinning added: "I have been playing handball since I was about five.

"I am from Norway and handball was big and competitive over there.

"It is great we as a club can now play competitively.

"The game has really taken off since the Olympic Games, which showed how action-packed and entertaining it could be.

"We chose to join the Scottish Handball Association as it is easier for us to travel to Edinburgh and Glasgow, where we will play most of our games as there is no court with the right dimensions to play in the North East."

A standard handball court is approximately 40 metres long and 20 metres wide - a large indoor arena to facilitate the action-packed sport which inspired the Vikings to form.

As well as their senior side, the Vikings have launched junior handball sessions at the Percy Hedley Sports Academy in Killingworth.

Slinning said: "We hope we attract new members to our club with a grant we were given from Sport England aimed at increasing participation in the North East.

"Handball is enjoyable, great fun, a great way to meet new people and a new exciting sport to try out for all ages and genders."

However, backed up by another King penalty save, the Vikings women got their game together and fought back superbly with six unanswered goals from Liane and a double-brace from top-scorer Larcy sandwiching Christke-Lamb's second to really get the Newcastle players pumped-up going into the closing minutes.

The home side continued their well-practiced attacking plays, with Liverpool left-winger Judit Radnoti scoring her seventh goal and left-half Marta Tubacka adding her fifth as they sought to level again in a tense finish. But the Vikings defence held firm, with player-coach Marlen Goulty firing a brilliant shot into the top corner over the Liverpool defence at the other end, and Newcastle's player-of-the-match Liane appropriately rounded off the scoring with her fourth goal to secure the one-goal 18-19 victory.

Newcastle Vikings Handball Club would like to thank Liverpool Handball Club for a great game, with the Merseysiders gracefully acknowledging the close loss as a great advert for women's handball, played in the correct spirit with some excellent performances. Goulty was pleased with all of the Vikings girls to come back for the win from their opening match of the season, but nevertheless recognised there were clearly a few things to practice on before the next match in two weeks' time away to the University of Leeds on 17 November.

The top 40 teams in the County rounds will progress to the regional finals, set to take place in April and May, over a single day for each region.

The first match of the County rounds took place on February 16, with teams from across the North East and Yorkshire heading to Gateshead Leisure Centre.

The top eight from all those entered will progress to the Regionals.

Teams from the North West, East Midlands, East, East Central, West Midlands, South West, London, South East and South Central will then take part in further County matches up until April 4.

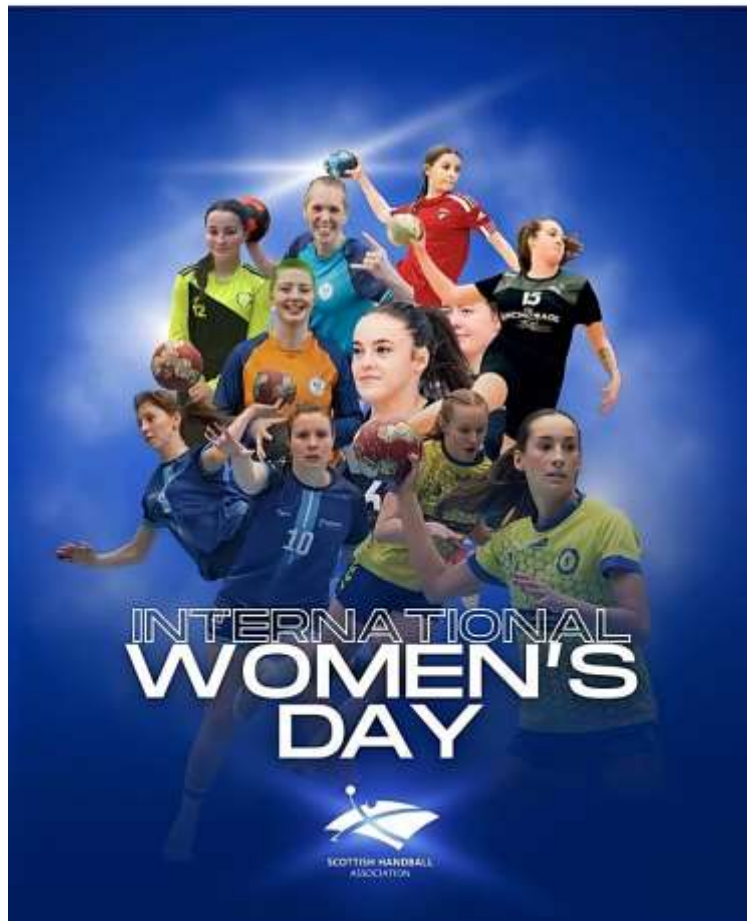

In a quick turn of events, on Tuesday evening, we received an official wild card invitation from our World Federation, the IHF, to compete in the Olympic Qualification Tournament in Budapest for the GB Senior Women's squad. The team travel today to Debrecen, Wednesday 10th April with matches beginning on Thursday 11th, before returning on Monday 15th April.

This is one of 3 Olympic Qualification events that are taking place, scheduled between 11 and 14 April.

The three women's tournaments are hosted by Debrecen in Hungary, Torrevieja in Spain and Neu-Ulm in Germany.

While the competitions in Debrecen and Torrevieja, the Olympic Qualification Tournaments #1 and #2 are scheduled to be played on 11, 12 and 14 April, the Olympic Qualification Tournament #3 in Neu-Ulm will take place on 11, 13 and 14 April.

Great Britain will replace Cameroon in Tournament 1 in Debrecen, and as a direct replacement there will be no further change of the match schedule.

Handball is a sport played throughout five continents by over 180 countries and 19 million people all ages, worldwide. Combining speed, strength, stamina, agility, technical precision, skill and teamwork, handball has become one of the fastest-paced and exciting Olympic sports.



Founded in 2012, the Newcastle Vikings Handball Club is the first handball club in the region. The club is made up of a diverse group of people with a common objective: practice handball whilst contributing to the development of the community through sport.

Marlen Slinning is the head coach and the driving force behind the club. Hailing from Norway with years of experience playing and teaching handball, she is passionate about developing young people and adults in the art of handball. Marlen has joined forces with a group of other sports enthusiasts and founded the club that to date has over 40 participants, both juniors and seniors.

We spoke with Marlen to find out more about her club and this fascinating sport.

### What makes Handball such a great sport?

Handball is an exciting and action packed team sport which is great fun for girls and boys of all ages. It is recognised as the fastest ball sport in the world and can be played both indoor and outdoor, even on the beach. Handball can be adapted to the equipment and space you have available and there are many simplified versions of the game which can suit different size groups and ability.

### How many club members do you have and how often do you hold training sessions ?

Currently we have 48 members and we hold sessions twice a week.

Mondays at Temple Park Leisure Centre, South Shields: Juniors, age 10-16 from 6.30-7.30pm - Seniors Development (age 17+) from 7-8.30pm. Those who are playing in the league stay until 10pm on Mondays.

Wednesday at Percy Hedley Sports Academy, Killingworth: Juniors, age 10-16 from 7-8pm - Seniors Development (age 17+) from 8-10pm.

### Do you get many people coming along to the training sessions who are completely new to the sport?

Our membership changes every year as we have a lot of students playing with us. This means every season we lose and gain new members due to people finishing or starting university. Around half of our members were completely new to handball when they joined us. So it is a great mix of beginners and experienced players.

### Do you have a Junior Team at the moment?

We have a Junior Team training at Percy Hedley Sports Academy on Wednesdays. We have 10 players in the age between 10-16.

We are also working closely with South Tyneside Council to promote our new Temple Park Junior sessions. We are also working closely with Sunderland School Sport to promote our sessions through school visits and taking part in their handball school games. We also offer all schools one free taster session of handball to hopefully attract new members to our junior sessions.

### What has been the biggest achievement for the Newcastle Viking club?

For our club the biggest achievement has been seeing how much the club has developed from when we started in September 2012. After only one year we had one women's team and one men's team playing competitive handball in the Scottish League and this year in the English League and we have one junior team. So after just one season we had over forty members.

### How can someone get involved with your club?

If someone would like to try out handball they are very welcome to any of our handball sessions. We offer three free taster sessions and welcome beginners as well as experienced players.



If schools or other community clubs would like a taste of handball they can get in touch with us to arrange and we can come to their venue.

As we are playing in the English North Development league we host home matches at Temple Park some weekends during the year and we will be hosting our annual handball tournament on the 2nd May from 9am to 7pm. We also welcome spectators to come along and support us during our matches. This has free entry and it's a great way to get a taste of the sport. Details of our match dates can be found here on our website.

Everyone at the club works extremely hard to raise the profile of handball across Tyne and Wear and the club is committed to offering activity to all of its members irrespective of what level they are at."

As well as training regularly at both South Tyneside and the Percy Hedley Sports Academy in Killingworth, Newcastle Vikings Handball Club also spend a lot of time visiting schools to introduce the sport during PE lessons and at after-school clubs.

Handball is a team sport which involves two teams of seven players; it is played at an extremely high pace and is suitable for males, females and juniors of all levels. There are now approximately 19 million people playing the sport worldwide and it has been an official Olympic sport since 1936.

She has always had a great passion for sporting activities and has 12 years of handball coaching experience. Marlen is also involved in national tutoring for Handball coaches and runs the Newcastle Vikings Handball Club.

The Global Sports ~ Global Learning Handball Program consists of 6 sessions. Each session includes 1 practical lesson and 1 theory lesson. After each practical handball lesson the group then participates in classroom activities whereby they record their experiences in the form of a sports coaching manual. The manual is a collection of their work which includes their wording of the rules and equipment required to play as well as detailed instructions for how to perform the skills. It also includes information about their school and their daily routines and lifestyle. This is then published and sent to a school in India where it is used to teach the Indian children how to play Handball. A letter/report full of pictures and photos is then sent back to the school from the children in India explaining how they used the manual. It also includes details of where they live and their culture. This relationship can continue post program.

Since 2010 the Global Sport ~ Global Learning program has been successfully delivered to over 60 schools and young offender institutes in England. The program is now currently being launched in Australia expanding the opportunities for schools to engage in global collaborations. Its website ([britishhandball.com](http://britishhandball.com)) can help you find a local club. You can also try some basic skills, such as throwing and catching a small ball outside in a safe place with your friends.



### What is mini handball?

Mini handball has the same rules as regular handball but each team has five players instead of seven and the court is smaller. It is designed for younger players and matches are usually much shorter than the adult version. There's also beach handball, which is played outdoors in the summer.

If you like fast team games then have a go at playing...

# Handball



Described as a mixture of netball, basketball and football, handball is fast and exciting and simple to learn how to play.

Handball can be played outdoors but most players take part in indoor events. A full-sized court is 40 metres long and 20 metres wide, with a goal at each end that's protected by a team's goalkeeper. Each team has six outfield players who throw the ball between their team, or dribble (bounce) it like in basketball, as they try to attack and throw the ball into their opponents' net to score a goal.

Each player can only hold the ball for up to three seconds and can only take three steps while holding the ball. This means the attacking team moves quickly, and the defending team tries to block and stop the ball from going in their net.

The goalkeeper is the only player allowed

in the goal area, which is a large semi-circle around the goal. An attacker can jump and throw for a goal on the edge of the area and then step into the area after the ball has been released.

A normal game has two halves of 30 minutes. To keep the action fast, a referee can award possession back to the defending team if the attacking team is thought not to be making an attempt to attack or shoot. If a player enters their own goal area, or a foul prevents a goal from being scored, a penalty is awarded. A penalty, which is also called a seven-metre throw, is taken from the seven-metre line and the attacker can throw directly at the goal with just the goalkeeper to beat.

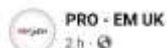

## Young North East handball players get smart new look thanks to Hay & Kilner kit sponsorship

Marlen says: "We had a really positive response when we set the club up and quickly established a junior section to capitalise on all the interest that the Olympics has generated from children and families who'd probably not seen handball before. "Our youngest players focus on the fun of spending active time with their friends while building the skills that will help them play the game as they get older, and it's great to see how much everyone enjoys taking part in these sessions." "We have around 50 members in our mini and junior sections, but we're always open to new players coming along to our training sessions and love giving them the chance to try a fun new team sport that they might decide is for them." "All our young members look great in their new sponsored kit and it's really giving them an extra feeling of belonging, so we're hugely grateful to Hay & Kilner for their support in making it available to everyone." ## Student keen to bring handball to Sunderland

Sunderland University student Jack Woods has been inspired by Great Britain's Handball teams and is determined to set up a club at the University.

Great Britain are making their competitive Olympic debut at the Copper Box at London 2012 and despite neither the Men's or Women's teams managing to secure a victory yet, the sport is proving to be a popular choice for spectators and the media and Woods is keen to capitalise on this growing interest.

Woods, from South Shields, said: "I first discovered Handball when I went to Germany on holiday when I was 14. I was on a school trip and it looked amazing.

"I held an interest from there really, but there is nothing in the North East."

Undeterred, the 19 year old maintained an interest in the sport until a British Handball UK Tour back in May offered him the chance to try the sport.

The tour visited Eldon Square in Newcastle where Woods, who has his Handball coaching certificates, took part in a taster session.

After impressing the organisers, he was invited to train with Newcastle University and travelled with them to compete in a handball tournament in Eindhoven in June.

Woods said: "There were students from all over the country: Loughborough, Lincoln, Brighton and Newcastle and we took four teams including a women's team.

"It was a huge tournament, the sport is massive in Europe. People I spoke to didn't even know that Britain had a team and they seemed surprised by that."

Woods is perplexed as to why Handball isn't more popular in the UK but believes that the Olympics is the perfect opportunity to build interest and participation in the sport.

"Handball is such a good sport but it needs exposure and the Olympics is perfect for that so the time is now," said Woods.

"I don't understand why it's not bigger here – its definitely more continental but I don't know why it hasn't made it over the channel.

"Maybe as an island we are excluded as to what goes on in mainland Europe where there are competitive league and the opportunity to play more teams?"

After his experience in Eindhoven, Woods has wasted no time in looking to establish a club at the University.

Sunderland University are now affiliated with the Association of British Universities Handball Clubs (ABUH) and Woods has a list of over twenty names of interested people who want to get involved.

"If you look at GB team, four years ago they didn't have a team and now they are in the Olympics," said Woods.

"Newcastle University are desperate for some local competition. This year I want to enter a team in as many competitions as we can and have friendly matches.

"I know there is interest around the country from the students I met in Eindhoven and hopefully by 2013 we can establish a BUCS Handball league. That's the goal.

"I'd encourage anyone looking for a new and interesting sport to get involved. It's a really fast paced game, really good fun. I'm glad its getting some exposure at the Games and I just hope I can build on that, and the sport in this country can build on that after the Games."

**Sunderland University's Handball teams are hoping that the London 2012 Olympic games will encourage more people to become involved in the sport.**

University of Sunderland Sports and Activities officer, Danielle Farrell, believes the introduction of a league will help generate interest in the sport.

Danielle said: "It is hard to get enough players to sign on because there is not a league for them to play in at the moment so we have a very small squad.

"We have a format for a league down on paper so hopefully it will be up and running soon."

As well as the promise of a new league, it is hoped that the showpiece event on Saturday will inspire people to get involved in the sport, and Danielle believes that Handball offers a great variation on most other sports.

She added: "I think people should try Handball because it is a really really fun and energetic game, to watch and play. You are indoors so it can be played all year round and it just gives you a bit of variety to play a different sport."

## Handball: "More things to come", says captain Woods

**University of Sunderland Handball captain Jack Woods thinks that the sport can grow in the North East following an exhibition day against a Newcastle side at CitySpace.**

Sunderland lost 15-9 against a men's side comprising of Newcastle Vikings and Gateshead, and then lost 11-9 to the Viking's women's side, but Woods said: "This, hopefully, is the springboard for more things to come."

There hasn't been a local league for Sunderland to join this year, meaning the team has been restricted to merely training sessions but there are high hopes for Handball, which has grown in popularity since the London 2012 Olympics.

As well as the two exhibition matches, there was also a 'give it a go' session where anyone could come on to the court and play the game as the University seeks to get more people involved in the sport.

Woods said: "Handball at the university is a really new thing. It's a new club this year; I think we're the newest sports society (at University of Sunderland).

"We're trying to get a local league together, especially with the guys from Newcastle Vikings. They'll be a league for us to play in and opportunities for people to play so it isn't just training, it'll be games as well."

The Vikings were set up in September 2012 and, along with Gateshead and a university team from Newcastle, are keen to join a league and star player Charlie Goulty said that they wanted to capitalise on the popularity of Handball from London 2012..

Goulty said: "With the interest that's been generated from the Olympics, that's been the idea, to really try and promote the sport.

"The point of today was to really start the ball rolling in terms of competition, that was one of the main goals: to get a competitive league going in the North East."

Sunderland were largely outclassed in the opening game although did get more into it as the tie wore on, and they matched the women's team throughout the second game. They improved defensively as Woods' organisational skills came into play, and they put together some fluent attacking play too.

Woods said of the performances: "I think we did really well. We played the girls in the second game but even the Vikings say that their girl's team are their strongest team.

"I'm really quite proud of the guys. Two of them had never played handball before, and the rest of the team had only played two competitive games.

"It's really good for the team, they've really enjoyed it and it's been a real big morale boost that they've held the score quite low."

The Handball team trains from 6-8pm every Sunday for men and women at CitySpace, and Woods added of the sport: "It's a really good workout, it's a very physical game, it's really fast and it's really fun to play."

## Woods positive about new-look Handball team

**Sunderland University's handball coach is optimistic about his team's prospects for this year.**

Jack Woods has long been interested in handball, a sport with a large following in mainland Europe but not in the UK.

However, the success of London 2012 provided a springboard for this "new" sport and Woods, part of the GB students' side, chose to set up a team for the University.

Last year, lacking experience, the team struggled in their first two tournaments, but some continental help drastically improved performances.



"We had a few Germans playing and we were suddenly unstoppable," Woods recalls. "Instead of losing, we weren't even letting teams score this time."

But the nature of University limits the lifespan for players, as proven with this year's all-new line-up.

"This year we've got three Cypriots, two Greeks and a Polish guy as well," Woods said of his cosmopolitan team.

"We've been blessed because finding a good pivot player is extremely hard, yet there's someone here who has played pivot for six years. His job is to create gaps so your players can have free shots on goal."

Woods, with his Level 1 coaching badge, knows he needs to get his team toughened up for this contact sport, adding: "I want them prepared for what they're going to feel.

"In a handball game, there'll be people throwing you and clattering you – I've broken my jaw twice! I play American Football for the University and it hurts less. In handball there's no pads, it's a very physical game."

Coaching takes place at CitySpace on Sunday evenings but Sunderland isn't participating in a BUCS (British Universities & Colleges Sport) handball league, forcing Woods into using his contacts to arrange matches. "A lot of players on my GB students' side run the handball programmes at Universities like Bangor, Loughborough, Bath, Leeds and Sheffield Hallam, so we've got options.

"Nationals are in February too, if we can get ourselves there. But we won't have a match for at least six weeks."

In the meantime Woods, as player-coach, has to teach a whole new sport to many of his teammates. The London legacy lives on.

## Manchester Handball Club overcome Durham in tense encounter

Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> November saw Durham Men's A Handball battle it out against Manchester Handball Club in what was originally a National Cup fixture. However, the visitors were made to forfeit the match due to excessive injuries and so a back-and-forth friendly match ensued instead, ending in a 30-26 win for Manchester.

Their 2<sup>nd</sup> team – who were the original team Durham were up against in the first round – had sustained “a couple of injuries in the last few days” according to the Manchester manager. They therefore were not able to play and so had to forfeit, meaning Durham were already through to the next round. Unsurprisingly, the visitors' manager described the situation as “really annoying”, although I'm not sure Durham would have the same take.

Nevertheless, a friendly game was played as their 2's were able to nab some of their 1's players. Hence, I found myself sitting courtside, ready to watch my first ever handball game, while ABBA's 'Voulez-Vous' was blaring from the speakers during the warm-up.

It was a lively start as Durham University's captain, Neo Yeung, crashed an effort against the crossbar – resulting in gasps and groans from those watching on. Manchester dealt the first blow, but Martin Lam sent a quick response by scoring on the other end for DU. A familiar pattern emerged, with goals being traded back and forth in the early minutes.

Manchester's number 3, playing on the left, was undoubtedly their danger man, towering above the Durham players while engaging his bullet arm. A pick of these early goals, however, came from Durham's number 15 – Will Strevens – who managed to nutmeg the opposition goalkeeper. It's no surprise, therefore, that Strevens ended up as Durham's Player of the Match.

The atmosphere inside the sports hall turned up a notch as Durham's supporters erupted in applause after Jonny Gregory's two shots made it 8-8, midway through the first half. Although the tension wasn't unbearable, perhaps because an array of songs accompanied the game in the background, including several Dua Lipa ones. This all made for an exciting but enjoyable atmosphere as the end of the first half neared.

After a couple of timeouts, Manchester built a 4-goal cushion thanks to their number 3 slicing through the air and scoring a couple of screamers. Saves from both DU goalkeepers – George Goddard and Sam Bollard – kept Durham in the game, as did their enthusiastic supporters; chants of “DU handball”, followed by five claps, filled the sports hall.

A couple of goals from Yeung (including a penalty) meant Manchester's lead was only five after the first 30 minutes, with the score reading 12-17 and Major Lazer & DJ Snake's tune 'Lean On' ringing out.

The beginning of the second half was accompanied by cries of “Come on Durham” and a lion's roar emitted from Goddard as he made an excellent save, tipping a shot onto the crossbar. He backed this up with several other blocks which prime Manuel Neuer would have been proud of.

Durham's comeback was further aided by some silky moves – most notably a behind-the-back assist from Nil Orts Bosch. With just over 15 minutes to play, the score stood at 19-21 to Manchester, forcing their manager to call a timeout, who was looking somewhat anxious.

The tension was further built by a lack of background music in the second half, much to my disappointment.

Lam then cut the deficit to one goal with 10 minutes left, but after a Durham timeout, Manchester kicked on – with their number 10 scoring several gems. He then proceeded to stare at the Durham supporters with daggers in his eyes, silencing the “DU handball” chants. The deficit rose to five, but this was cut short to three; the score being 24-27 with 2:30 to play. However, Manchester were able to hang on thanks to goals in quick succession, handing DU a 26-30 defeat.

Despite the loss, the Durham Handball team can take great pride in the fact that they were up against a mix of players from Manchester 1's and those from the 2's. Manchester 1's compete at the very highest level – in the Men's Premier North handball league – while their 2's compete in the North Regional League. Meanwhile, Durham isn't in either and yet still managed to push their opponents to the very last minute and cause them problems.

Considering DU handball is one of the university's youngest teams – having only been formed in 2014 – there is certainly evidence of a bright and promising future. I highly recommend going along to support the handball teams in the future as it makes for a great watch, especially if you are an ABBA fan.

# “A mixture of basketball, netball and futsal”: Introduction to DU Handball

One of the key factors that made Durham University named Sports University of the Year by The Times was the huge breadth in sport that it offers. One of those is handball — a sport popular in mainland Europe, but less well-known in the UK. We sat down with DU Handball’s club captain Sophie Granville, men’s B team captain Tom Melling, and new player Ozzy Agyapong Beach to discuss how handball is growing at the University and across the country.

Handball is a high-scoring, fast-paced team sport where players attempt to score goals by throwing the ball into the opposition net. It is often end-to-end and never short of exciting moments. “That’s the big thing to get used to”. Tom tells us. “A full match is an hour long and you’d expect getting around one goal a minute so you get many high scores and that can be a weird thing to get used to”.

He also described the sport as “fast, exciting and a sense of togetherness”. This has been something that the University team has tried to introduce to its newest members. In recent years it has developed from a team that would “struggle to get teams for matches and train in Hild Bede without goals” to “being selective with who we want to play”. Sophie points towards an increase in the number of UK students taking up the sport.

“We started about six years ago, but the team was reliant on Erasmus students. I joined three years ago but that was the first year with a women’s team, but it has just grown and grown. Now we have enough for four teams: two men’s and two women’s and now because more English people are getting involved, it means the team can progress more, because people are staying for three or four years at university”.

Sophie is the first ever female club captain at DU Handball and this season marks the first time that both the men’s and women’s teams have had supplementary B teams. They have worked closely with DU Women in Sport and Team Durham to ensure that the sport gets more publicity. “My drive this year is to make the women’s team more well known. A lot of people have been messaging the account asking if it’s just men who can get involved:..

“DU Women in Sport, which started this year, has helped too. We have been tagging them a lot when we are doing women’s only stuff so that gets on there as well”. Unfortunately, this season has been one of transition for the women’s team, but the speed of development with new players has been very encouraging viewing.

“We beat York for the first time at the end of last term and at the beginning we didn’t expect to see that much progression. We’ve got so many players this year and I didn’t expect that”.



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The men’s team are currently competing in Division One, with the aim to consolidate their place in their league. However, the B team have their eyes on not only promotion, but also winning the Division Three title.

Given that this is their first ever full season, that would be an outstanding achievement. For the A team, they have the excitement of competing in the National Cup, having progressed in the first round back in November.

“We have entered the national cup for the first time, that’s not a university thing; that’s like handball’s equivalent to the FA Cup. We have the next round of that in a month so that’s exciting as well”. This, combined with BUCS fixtures for all teams and the Summer Cup (which will feature universities from across the country) provides plenty of landmark matches over the coming months.



For the A teams, the focus is on success. However, for the B teams development is paramount. "It's the first year we've had a proper B team, so that's quite exciting which, similar to the women's, mainly has people who haven't played before, so it's been about development, getting them used to playing the sport. We've been playing lots of friendlies which helps get experience". Players are not only attracted to the sport but to the social side of the club too.

"Because people are really enjoying it, they are staying to be part of it even if they're not necessarily good at the sport or are still improving. That's attracting others and people have just brought their friends in because it is a nice welcoming environment as it doesn't matter how well you play so long as you want to turn up and people hear about it through that.

"For handball, the skill level in the UK is a lot different to in Europe. It's a lot more beginner friendly which has helped a lot. It means that anyone can come along and play at a competitive level which is amazing as you can bring someone along". The attitude that the country has towards handball shows how it is helping to grow the sport from all levels.

"It's definitely growing in England. We've had quite a few schools in Durham and County Durham approach us wanting us to coach them because they want us to help them start out and I know that England Handball Association are starting to push handball in schools and there are lots of clubs and it adds to the quality levels".

"As everyone gets better that's when it'll start to grow as there is more reason to publicise it. At the moment no-one really knows about the national cup or the league. But, as we get better, people will think it's more worth their while".

"The GB men's team has just got further than they ever have done before in the Euros qualification, so it is growing at the highest level and the lowest level. As people hear more, they start to watch it and it is a very exciting sport to watch so that will just help with the exposure".

So, what makes a beginner good at handball? "I'd say if you have any sort of athletic ability, you'll already have some advantage. If you can jump high, run fast and if you are agile, you'll be good. Obviously if you can throw and catch the ball that's more than ideal. Getting in initially, athleticism is good. A lot of the movement is similar to other sports. If you've played rugby before, your footwork will be good".

However, goalkeeping in handball is a different matter. Goals are common, and attackers almost always have the upper hand.

"This year the women's goalkeeper played football and, whilst she knows how to play in goal, she says it's so quick and said, "they're scoring so many goals." Because handball is such a high scoring match having the ability to play in goal is about changing the mindset".

Contrary to football, handball matches tend to become higher scoring as the quality of the players increases. "At a low level, you wouldn't see a lot of goals. If you're good at handball it's almost impossible to stop the ball". Whilst players are not allowed to shoot in the D, the ability to throw the ball with such power and accuracy means that most close-range shots are unstoppable.

What makes DU Handball stand out amongst other Team Durham sports and other university level handball teams? Sophie certainly had a more unorthodox route into DU Handball. "Me and my friend first started because we wanted to get stash! I lived in Brunei, and we played handball, but it was a different sport there".

"We went along but it wasn't that sport, but I stayed because people were nice and, in that year, it was quite an international sport. It was a really nice group of people and having so many international students made me feel more at home. Now though, it's just the main sport I play. I've ditched the others".

Ozzy points to the diversity of players that you get in DU Handball as a key reason why it has such a friendly and relaxed atmosphere. "It is also very inclusive and diverse in the sense that we're from many different countries. Asia, Europe, Latin America to name a few, so anyone can come along and find someone who's got a similar background".

Handball at Durham evidently caters to all levels of players and is starting to attract social members too, despite being handed some tricky training hours to make. "It's the first year we've had 7am training sessions twice a week but people are turning up which I didn't expect".

Even some people have come along and not particularly liked the sport but have stayed on as social members. "There's no problem with that. And 7am sessions aren't compulsory! We train every day except Saturday, so there's plenty of opportunity to come along!".

Handball certainly is growing in the UK, both amongst players and spectators. Durham is at the heart of this growth, with even Ozzy hearing about Durham's set up when he was studying at Bangor for his undergraduate degree. However, there was certainly one selling point that stood out above the others: "If you want DU stash, this is the society for you!".
